# National Register of Enduring Power of Attorney

#### Update on issue progress

The creation of a National Register for Enduring Powers of Attorney (EPoA) has been recommended in the past as one way of preventing elder abuse.

The separate issue of making Power of Attorney laws the same across Australia (or 'harmonising' them) has become synonymous with this recommendation. So where are we now on these issues? Let's recap.

### Timeline:

**2017** <u>Australian Law Reform Commission</u> recommends creating of National EPoA register and harmonisation of EPoA laws

**Nov 2019** COAG (Council of Attorneys General) agree to work toward EPoA reforms and mandatory National Register

April 2021 Public consultation is conducted solely in regards to the creation of a national register. Consideration of broader law reform (e.g. harmonisation of EPoA laws) to follow development of National EPoA Register

# **Escaping Violence Payment**

*Up to \$5000 for women escaping violent intimate partner relationships* 

From October 19<sup>th</sup>, a new avenue of financial support will be available for people escaping violent intimate partner relationships. Although the Elder Abuse Prevention Unit's helpline data shows that most perpetrators are either the older person's adult son or daughter, intimate partner violence still accounts for around 9-12% of cases.

#### So what exactly is the eligibility?

You must be:

- 18+
- An Australian citizen/ permanent residency
- Have not accessed the program in past 12 months

#### What can people get?

- Up to \$1500 for essential items
- Up to \$3500 in goods a services, such as moving expenses, bonds and other support

#### Where do you access it?

The focus of the program is simplicity. It is encouraged for people to simply ask their **current** support service to apply for the payment. In either case, you can make contact with UnitingCare Australia via their '<u>Escaping Violence Payment</u>' webpage or <u>enquiry form</u>.

You do not need to be working with UnitingCare.

#### Will it affect social security payments?

 No. According to the media release it will not be considered reportable income or taxable income.

#### Other requirements include:

- Person has experienced intimate partner violence within the last 12 weeks and the relationship has ended
- Violence (of course) includes the full scope of abuse types, not just physical violence
- Either the person or perpetrator has left home
- The person is experiencing financial stress and unable to meet current financial needs

# Australian Press Standards change to acknowledge elder abuse

New sources of assistance for reporting on elder abuse

The Australian Press Council is a core body responsible for setting principles and guidelines for all forms publishing. For example, it has <u>guidelines</u> surrounding published material that reports on family and domestic violence. In these guidelines, it recommends that the published material be accompanied by *'sources of assistance'* i.e. services that can support readers who themselves, may need to seek assistance.

The Australian Press Council maintains an official list of suggested 'sources of assistance'. This is why you very commonly see the same referrals following many news articles reporting on the same topic. It is this list that was recently updated to help improve sources of assistance for articles reporting specifically on elder abuse topics.

The sources of assistance for family and domestic violence reporting now suggests the 1800 ELDERHELP number, as well as the <u>compass.info</u> website for relevant publishing/ reporting. This is a great step to supporting people access elder abuse services, as well as increasing broader awareness in the community nationwide!
